Introduction

Dear Parent/Carers,

The aim of this booklet is to offer subject specific guidance to support students and parents as we move closer towards your child's external examinations.

As a parent, we would ask that you continue to support your child with encouragement and praise and remind them to carry out regular revision using their teacher's advice. This booklet provides parents with key information about Year 11.

Here are some suggestions of how you can support your child:

Students who do best in exams:

- · have worked hard throughout the two years
- have kept up to date with their homework
- have revised thoroughly, carefully, and efficiently
- feel confident
- · have parents who take an interest in their child's revision

What can parents do?

Here is some general advice:

Do

- Make sure your child is in school every day, maintaining 100% attendance and fully equipped for school.
- Make sure that you get your child to show you their homework and make sure that they can access the homework tasks on SMHW.
- Discuss with your child what will be involved during the revision period and what your role could be.
- Use flash cards your child has made to test them on their knowledge.
- Provide the environment necessary for success. Students need a place to work and revise which is quiet, calm, and comfortable (probably the most important need is quiet).
- Respond positively when asked for help and give plenty of praise and encouragement. Ask exactly how you can help and if you cannot help immediately, say when it is convenient.
- Point out what your child has done well when you look at their work. Do not dwell on errors, emphasise the positives.
- Keep your child supplied with healthy food and drinks.

- Be prepared to listen when you child wants to talk about issues as everything becomes more emotional and heightened during the examination period.
- Encourage morning revision when the brain is more receptive and discourage studying right up to when they go to bed.
- Encourage your child to plan in time to rest and to do other things outside of revising and studying.

Don't

- Make comparisons with brothers, sisters, friends and so on.
- Unintentionally add to their worries by constantly mentioning the exams.
- Relate too much to when you were sitting exams at school or how you revised or prepared.
- Worry if their revision techniques seem strange or unusual.
- Let students listen to music when doing revision. If students do, ensure it is music
 without lyrics as there is conclusive research that music with lyrics deters effective
 revision.
- Distract them unnecessarily.
- Overload your child with chores or other responsibilities when they have revision to complete.
- Expect them to study all the time, as taking some time out to relax will have a positive effect on their work.
- Join in the general anxiety stay calm, serene, and confident.

In Summary

There is a great deal you can do as a parent. You cannot revise for them and however much you would like to you cannot take the examinations for them, but you can be invaluable in making the process smooth, calm, and successful.

Revision Guidance

Making your revision count


What is Revision?

Revision means 'looking again.'

Revision involves:

- Finding out what you know & understand (and what you do not)
- Building on what you know & understand
- Finding out what has slipped your memory
- Working on ways on retaining information
- Practising answers
- Preparing to show what you have learned

Typical Forgetting Curve for Newly Learned Information



Psychological research suggests that:

- When we learn something, we rapidly forget much of it. This is shown by the graph above
- When we re-visit something we have learned repeatedly, we remember it better and we forget less.

Revision Planning

Which revision strategies work best?

Research has identified that some revision strategies are more effective than others. The table below shows you the differences in some common techniques.

Technique	Effectiveness	Description of Technique
Practice Testing	High	Self-testing is any retrieval practise. This could be using revision cards, practise exam questions or any way of practising the retrieval of knowledge.
Distributed practice	High	Developing a schedule of revisions /learning activities over time.
Elaborative Interrogation	Moderate	Thinking about 'why' you have answered a question or creating an explanation for a response.
Self-explanation	Moderate	Linking new information to known information or using applied questions (problem-based learning)
Interleaved Practice	Moderate	Developing a schedule that mixes different techniques during a period of study.
Summarisation	Low	Writing summaries of concepts /area of study.
Highlighting	Low	The use of highlighters of underlining while reading or rereading.
Keyword Mnemonic	Low	Use of key terms/ acronyms / images to associate with concepts to be learned.
Imagery	Low	Attempting to form mental images of materials while reading.
Re-reading	Low	Revisiting a text that has already been read.

As you can see above, rereading and highlighting are not highly effective ways to revise. Revision techniques like practice testing, (testing what knowledge has been learnt through self-testing, quizzes, or past exam questions) and distributed practice, (developing learning activities and a schedule of revision over time) are the most effective ways of revising.

The subject information pages will give guidance on each subject and key information on the exam as well as other useful information about the course. The school website also has detailed guidance on revision resources for each subject. Some of the most effective revision strategies are detailed below.

Effective Revision Strategies

1. Using Flash cards or Revision cards effectively

Flashcards or revision cards are a common revision strategy but crucially, however, too many students fail to use them effectively for self-testing. Students need to design effective revision flashcards.

Making informative notes by selecting the most significant facts, concepts or terms needed for that topic and then making self-testing flashcards. It is crucial that students incorporate self-testing in this model as a way of retrieving key knowledge.

2. Practise testing

This is a tried and tested method of students testing themselves using practice questions. The effect of exploring worked examples or exam answers, as well as writing their own, helps students process, practice and refine their revision to improve their chances of exam success.

There are many ways practice testing can occur. This can be through your child or you as a parent testing your child using their revision cards, students going through past exam papers or students using educational apps available for revision in certain subjects. Practice testing is the best way for students to know and further cement what knowledge has moved into their long-term memory, whilst also identifying what knowledge has not.


3. Spaced Practice or Distributed practice

This is where students space their revision over several revision sessions rather than the more commonly used mass practice where students study one topic at a time. Massed practice is more commonly used although it is less effective and is often done when students 'cram' for exams. The main reason students are often forced into massed practice is that they start revising too late and are forced to cram as they have no real alternative.

Spaced practice means students might revise several topics and switch between topics rather than learning one thing at a time. This is more challenging and means students do not study one topic for too long (it should be noted students should gain a decent understanding of one topic before moving to the new one) – for example in History students learn about Henry VIII's government on Monday. In the evening they would review and make notes on this topic using one of the effective revision strategies. They would then review this topic on Wednesday but also switch in another topic e.g. Why Henry wanted an annulment

and then again on Friday students would review both topic and look at a new topic. This also allows for effective interleaving and retrieval of the knowledge students need.


Distributed practice works well with many revision techniques and is shown to be highly successful in helping with recall ability. The diagram below shows how you could structure this technique:



4. The Cornell Method

This strategy is a well-known note-taking approach: this strategy gets students thinking metacognitively, asking questions, noting key terms, and summarising the content being revised.

This is effective (unlike where students are just reading and highlighting text or randomly writing out information) and gets students to actively engage with their work. A summary of what this looks like is on the diagram below:

- When doing practice questions make sure you read them carefully and only use knowledge that is relevant to the question.
- When answering the 6-mark questions in Section B, you should refer to precise evidence from your own practical work and back this up by linking these examples to the physical skills.
- When answering the 12-mark questions in Section C, you should utilise the P.E.E method.
 Make your point, give evidence from the professional work, and explain. The explain portion of your answer should also include opinionated analysis.

- Create a 'key vocabulary' list and use them to test yourself or get other people to test you
- Practice long questions answers to time yourself; it is important that you manage your time in the exam well

Advice on preparing for Summer Examinations:

The best preparation for the maths exams is completing past exam papers. These can be found on the exam boards website.

- When attempting questions make sure that you are in a quiet space, have access to the Mathswatch or Corbett maths website, a calculator, protractor, ruler, compass, and rubber.
- If you do not understand a question, you can type key words into the search bar on Mathswatch or scroll down the contents list on Corbett maths.
- You should then watch the related video before attempting the question again.
- The AQA website also provide access to the mark schemes so if you are still unsure you can look at the mark scheme to see how the question is being marked.
- It is also a good idea to highlight this area as needing further practice. Both Mathswatch and Corbett maths provide additional worksheets with all their videos.
- You can also make use of the Mathswatch 6-week revision schedule that is in the extras section of their website.
- Additional advice can be sought from your classroom teacher. This could be by asking for help on a 1-2-1 basis, bring a question to a lesson or by emailing them

- You should create revision cards on each part of the course as we study them. You can then use these to revise.
- When doing practice questions make sure you read them carefully and only use knowledge that is relevant to the question and look at the number of marks.
- Create "new words" lists as you learn. There will be a lot of new vocabulary.

- You should use the shared teams' area for direct access to revision links and resources.
- When answering questions ensure you identify the command word in the question to ensure you are answering what is being asked of you.
- Get to know your calculator this is a key piece of equipment in science exams, so you need to understand how it works properly and what the display means.
- Use the personalised topic checklists for each paper so you have a clear understanding of what you could be tested on for each paper.
- Know the required practical's studied, they will come up. There is a PowerPoint with resources on each in your teams' area. Questions linked to the required practical work will account for at least 15% of the overall grade.

Sitting your exams

The night before

- Only attempt light revision from your revision notes, not any new revision.
- Get all the equipment you need (4 black pens, 2 pencils, ruler, rubber, calculator, protractor, pair of compasses and a clear water bottle with the label removed) ready the night before. The last thing you want is to be rushing around looking for stuff in the morning.
- Try to get a good night's sleep no computer games or late-night TV!

On the day

- · Get up in plenty of time.
- Make sure you have everything you need before you leave home.
- If you want to, do some last-minute revision by flicking through your notes.
- Make an agreement with your friend not to talk about the exam.

Use your time wisely

- Work out how much time you can devote to each question or section. Your teacher would have told you this already.
- As you take the exam you may find yourself falling behind schedule do not panic just work a little faster.
- Do not fall into the trap of spending most time answering the questions you know least about. Give them a go but do not be afraid to move on. It is important that you try and answer all the necessary questions as in some exams the final questions carry the most marks.

Tackling the questions

- Read every question at least twice.
- Think about the question before you get into your answer.
- Work out how long and detailed the answer needs to be by looking at the space you are given and the number of marks available.
- For essay-type questions outline the main points you intend to include in your answer. Without an outline you are likely to stray from the point or forget important points.
- Remember to stick to what the question is asking.
